Incomplete doctor-family communications

- What families hear from doctors: "Seizures" and "We don't know"
- Discrepancy between doctor's vs. family's view of patient condition grows
- Families unprepared for final decisions, outcomes and rehab requirements
- Doctors may not be fully aware of long-term patient outcomes

Analyses: Cytokine, genetic, single-cell RNA sequencing, neuropathology studies (Yale), metagenomic and auto-antibody analyses (UCSF)

Results made publicy available

- Have families articulate what they understand and their values
- Printable NORSE brochure <u>www.norseinstitute.org</u>
- Request autopsy
- Request organ donation: transplant and NORSE/FIRES biorepository at Yale
- Provide diagnosis codes, Rx, therapy and referrals for rehab
- Discharge planning guide <u>www.norseinstitute.org</u>
