NATIONAL COORDINATING CENTER FOR EPILEPSY

- The purpose of this program is to improve access to coordinated and comprehensive quality care for children and youth with epilepsy with an emphasis on populations experiencing health disparities and residing in medically underserved/rural communities:
 - Transitions
 - Telehealth
 - Learning Collaborative

NATIONAL COORDINATING CENTER FOR EPILEPSY: GOALS

- Goal 1: Implement a National and grantee program infrastructure to ensure that CYE obtain sustainable, coordinated and comprehensive quality care
 - Support 7 state grantees and their 69 clinical sites that serve ~25,500 CYE

Goal 2: Develop state-of-the-art, high quality, quality
improvement (QI) learning collaboratives and protocols for
grantees to ensure they have access to relevant evidence-based
models, best practices, and strategies

NATIONAL COORDINATING CENTER FOR EPILEPSY: GOALS

- Goal 3: Leverage telehealth to increase access to care for CYE in underserved areas/populations and increasing the PCP capacity
- Goal 4: Develop and implement a comprehensive evaluation methodology to support and monitor outcomes of the Coordinating Center and grantees implementation, evaluation, and spread of evidence-based epilepsy-related services

ACCESS IMPROVEMENT AND MANAGEMENT FOR EPILEPSY WITH TELEHEALTH (AIM-ET)


- Partner pediatric neurologists with pediatric practices in underserved and rural areas to implement telehealth:
 - University of Utah
 - Stanford University
 - Alabama Department of Public Health/University of Alabama
- Collecting data to assess outcomes on patient satisfaction, missed work/school hours, mileage



PROJECT ECHO

The ECHO (Extension for Community
 Healthcare Outcomes) model™ is a telementoring hub and spoke platform that
 leverages technology to bring together
 specialty care providers at academic medical
 centers (hub) and healthcare professionals in
 local communities (spokes)

AAP ECHO SUPERHUB



CHILDREN AND YOUTH WITH EPILEPSY TELEECHO

- In 2013, the AAP partnered with the ECHO Institute to launch the CYE TeleECHO pilot project to increase access to care for CYE in New Mexico
 - Launched 4 other CYE ECHOs: CA, IL, NY, KS/MO

 Developed standardized curriculum using evidenceinformed clinical guidelines and practices for the management of epilepsy; integrated team-based care in a patient/family-centered medical home

AAP EPILEPSY AND COMORBIDITIES ECHO

- Incorporating the CYE TeleECHO standardized curriculum and the American Academy of Neurology (AAN) quality measurement set for epilepsy to facilitate improvement at the practicelevel for:
 - Early and accurate diagnosis
 - Reduction and monitoring of anti-seizure therapy
 - Improved care coordination
 - Patient-centered care
 - Timely and appropriate referrals
 - Health care transitions



RECRUITMENT

- Recruiting up to 20 pediatric primary care practices providing services to pediatric patients and serving diverse communities via a 'Call for Proposals'
- Multi-disciplinary teams to lead practice QI efforts:
 - Physician champion/MOC local leader
 - Nurse practitioner
 - Additional team member such as front office, practice manager, medical assistant, or care coordinator

RECRUITMENT

Eligibility criteria:

- Provide pediatric primary care, including at least 10 visits with CYE per month
- Secure approval from practice leadership to participate in this project
- Identify a core QI team responsible for providing leadership and oversight within the practice for the project
- Agree to all participation requirements

Selection criteria includes:

- A desire and capacity for process improvement to improve access to quality healthcare for CYE
- Pediatric practices representing communities with underserved populations will be given priority



Checklist for Providing Care to Children and Youth with Epilepsy (Initial Diagnosis)

The purpose of this document is to provide primary care providers with the information necessary to provide care to children and youth with epilepsy, as well as to successfully transition children and youth with epilepsy to another health care provider (e.g. another pediatric primary care provider, adult primary care provider, or subspecialist).

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
